

FROM THE MAIN GATE

In last month's article, I briefly mentioned that guests may call residents from the North and Main Gate Guest Phones in order to gain entry into Hershey's Mill. This month, I would like to relay to residents the instructions that their guests must follow to operate these guest phones. To do so, your guest must:

Know the HOUSE (Address) NUMBER of the resident they are visiting.

Press the RED BUTTON to activate the phone.

Enter the HOUSE (Address) NUMBER as a **4-DIGIT NUMBER ONLY**. If the house number has fewer than four digits, add the zeros at the BEGINNING of the house number in order to make it a 4-digit number.

EXAMPLES

House number 7 would be entered as 0007

House number 91 would be entered as 0091

House number 897 would be entered as 0897

House number 1162 would be entered as 1162

Wait for a few seconds while the phone dials the

residence. Once the resident picks up, both parties can speak with each other for 60 seconds before the phone hangs up.

The resident must press "9" on THEIR phone to open the gate.

Now that Hershey's Mill has transitioned to voice over internet phone service, you may find it necessary to press "9" several times in order to raise the gate for your guest. After pressing "9" a few times, rather than hang up immediately, verify that your guest is no longer on the other end of the line. If the line is dead, this signifies that the gate went up.

A common misconception is that a guest can pull up to the guest phone and use their cell phone to call the resident, in order for the resident to open the gate. This is inaccurate, as a cell phone has no connection with the gate itself. All calls must originate from the guest phone. If you find yourself in a situation where you are pressing "9" on your phone to open the gate, but your guest states the gate is not going up, please make sure your guest is not calling you from a cell phone.

Lastly, the guest gate phones are programmed by Security to dial one phone number, containing an area code of 484 or 610, per residence; and this phone number can be either a landline or cell phone number. Any phone number, containing an area code other than 484 or 610, given to Security cannot be entered into the guest gate phone system.



The Favorites button is the blue button with the white heart in the upper right center of the FIOS remote. By now you may have pressed it only to find it doesn't seem to have any way to create your favorite channels. It's not intuit-

nel (CH) button on the remote to jump to the general location of channel you would like to add. Use the up/down arrow buttons to home in on the exact desired channel. You can hold down the Channel button to quickly move through the channel listing to get where your desired channel is located.

ive in that respect but that's by design. The Favorites button works only as an access button for your Favorites once they are set up.



You can also hold down the up or down arrow buttons to speed things along at a sequential rate. Once you arrive at your desired favorite channel press the OK button. This will add a red heart icon to the left of your desired channel. Continue the procedure to add more channels as desired.

Setting up your favorite channels is easy and once that's done then you can use the Favorites button to access your favorite channels.

Start by pressing the Menu button then press the up arrow button to get to Settings. Press OK twice. Press the down arrow button until you get to Favorite channels and press OK again. At Favorites 1 press OK again. Using the down arrow button move to Add or Remove Channels and press OK. Use the chan-

nel (CH) button on the remote to jump to the general location of channel you would like to add. Use the up/down arrow buttons to home in on the exact desired channel. You can hold down the Channel button to quickly move through the channel listing to get where your desired channel is located. When finished press the Exit button. Now you can use that "Heart" button to view your favorite channels. What will appear is the familiar channel listing grid that is now configured to show only your favorites. Use the up or down arrow buttons or the Channel button to move to the channel you wish to view. Press OK and watch away!

Before I could pose a single question, Joe said, "I guess you could say I've been from the White House to the outhouse". Right then and there I knew I was in for a treat. Although Joe is an Eaton neighbor of mine, little did I know that he is a professional cinematographer, with a long list of credits in the field of motion-

picture photography. His career was established as a young man and his reputation led to the honor of working with White House residents – Gerald Ford, Jimmy Carter, Ronald Reagan, George H.W. Bush, Bill Clinton and other politicians like John McCain.

Joe will tell you that he's lived a charmed life, surrounded by guardian angels and he wonders, even now, how it all came to be. He was born 73 years ago and lived with his parents and three brothers in a row home in Lansdowne, PA. He attended Monsignor Bonner High School and, as captain of their track team, attained the honors of "All Catholic" and "All State". Sports, he commented, gave him the confidence to not only win races, but also become a team player, prepared to face conflict

in the work place and diffuse it successfully.

Coincidentally, he also learned something about romance. During his senior year, he met Carol who was a member of the color guard for Lansdowne



Aldan. It's the story of high school sweethearts who met at half time and are spending a lifetime together. This year they celebrate their 52nd anniversary.

As often happens, along came children. First born was Mark, followed by Kirstin. Both were good students and strong soccer players. They participated in their sport throughout high school and into college. Both have families of

their own now and live nearby. Kids and grandchildren, numbering seven, are the light of Joe and Carol's lives and the entire family enjoys gathering frequently at the Vandergast home.

Joe would be the first to tell you that the strength of their family circle comes from his wife. Carol learned early in



developments of a budding career. His first big step was to join the Army in 1963. Based on his post high school job working in a photo developing lab, he was categorized upon enlistment as a photographer. From boot camp, Joe was sent to a huge New York City pictorial center which was an old Paramount studio. The captain of the facility assigned him to camera supply. If you remember Radar from "Mash", you can imagine Joe at work.

Soon after his discharge, Joe landed a job at the H.G. Peters motion picture studio down the street. He was paid \$200 per week as studio manager. That was big bucks in 1966. Five years later, he was laid off since the industry never really took hold outside of NY. Not discouraged, Joe heard KYW needed a newsreel cameramen. He landed the

job and loved it! After six years, Joe was promoted to shooting documentaries. This type of filming became his vocational favorite. A highlight for him was in the mid-seventies when he and his wife traveled to Africa with Malcom Poindexter to film "Welcome Home" – a project prompted by the popu-

In addition, Joe would coordinate that event with an NFL game in proximity and make it a twofer shoot. Joe recalls one NFL Division Championship game played in Philly against Dallas (1982). His brother traveled with him on this occasion and when Philly won, there was a moment in the locker room when Dick Vermeil gave Joe a celebratory nod across the room.

Based on his success with documentaries, Joe was recruited as Director of Photography for "Speak up America". He completed 26 episodes of this popular TV series that took him all over the United States. Herb Denenberg made a lasting impression on him during this period.



lar TV mini-series, "Roots". Forty African American people from the Tri-State area joined them spending ten days documenting the African experience. He thoroughly enjoyed capturing actual news and meeting the people involved. Jessica Savitch and Mort Crim were journalists with whom Joe also worked closely in those days and developed lifelong relationships.

During the 70's and 80's, Joe found a way to combine business with pleasure. On various weekends, he and Carol would hop in their VW and drive to Penn State where Joe covered the games. "Heck," he said, "I'd get twelve cents a mile for my gas and we'd stop for a delicious smorgasbord dinner at our favorite Firehouse en route home!"


In the period since 1980, Joe was a free-lance artist who became city-wide known as a talented directory of photography. The political scene easily became Joe's predominant subject matter. Political consultants recognized his work and he traveled far and wide to capture races. One he'll never forget was the Senate election in Massachusetts between Ted Kennedy and Mitt Romney in 1994. He spent time with both candidates in the general election and made a decision to never become affiliated with both sides of a race again. All in all, over the years, Joe covered countless well-known politicians in addition to the Presidents mentioned. He attributes part of his success to relating to his clients and keeping in touch.

Now that he is retired and living in The Mill, these days you may find Joe with a circle of neighbors at the Eaton pool, on his back listening to do whop songs, or just walking. He told me that he considers himself "the happiest guy in the

world". I'm convinced that Joe is an artist of his craft. Next time you see Joe, ask him if the General thought so too after taking his passport picture.





We made reservations thru Open Table and requested a 6 p.m. reservation but were informed that the closest time would be 5:30 p.m. At 1:30 p.m., a gentleman called to confirm the reservation. However, when we showed up at 5:25 p.m., the hostess informed us that there was not a reservation under our name but they could seat us. In anticipation of large numbers of battle casualties during World War II, the U.S. Army's Medical Department began a hospital construction program throughout the country in the early part of the war. Under this program, the Valley Forge Hospital was built in Charlestown Township near Phoenixville. It opened on March 12, 1943 and from that date until 1950, it treated more than 60,000 GIs.



The hospital was situated on a 180-acre site that contained 130 two-story semi-permanent brick buildings according to the army medical corps. All the medical buildings were connected with a total of 7 miles of corridors.

The hospital had a bed capacity of 2,509. In the beginning it was staffed by Army personnel, 100 physicians and surgeons, 200 nurses and several

hundred administrative officers and enlisted men. Later in the war, a large staff of civil-service employees was added.

During the war nearly, 100 percent of the hospital's patients were combat casualties. During the Korean War and the war in Vietnam, the hospital treated non-combat-disabled soldiers. Thus, it specialized in plastic surgery, the blind and psychiatry.

Caring for blinded soldiers and teaching them self-sufficiency was one of the pro-



grams at Valley Forge General. These soldiers were taught to read braille, and they developed finger skills by learning weaving and typing.

So successful was this program that the hospital was chosen as the location of a Hollywood movie. In August 1950, a cast and crew came to the hospital to film *Lights Out*, starring Arthur Kennedy, Peggy Dow and Richard Eagan. The story was about a blinded WWII soldier and his rehabilitation at Valley Forge General. The film, now called *Bright Victory*, premiered in July 1951 in Phoenixville, where much of the filming took place. Residents were used as extras.

Part of the hospital's rehabilitation program centered around a vast recreation and entertainment schedule, aimed at keeping the servicemen's morale high. On the grounds were a number of ball fields and tennis courts. Indoors were a fully equipped gymnasium, a bowling alley and an Olympic-size swimming pool. Teams of administrative staff and patients were organized into intramural leagues as well as intermural hospital teams that competed with other Army Hospitals in baseball, basketball, boxing and archery.

The hospital also had its own post office, outdoor amphitheater, newspaper and radio station. Over the years, big names from society, entertainment and sports came to cheer the patients. The visitors included the Duke and Duchess of Windsor, Rudy Vallee, Eddie Canter, Gene Kelly, Duke Ellington,

Edgar Bergen and Charlie McCarthy, Ike Williams (the lightweight boxing champion) and Joe Walcott (the heavy-weight boxing champion).


One of the most popular places was the post chapel, where hundreds of weddings were held. Records from the Chester County Historical Society report weddings between patients and their sweethearts from home, nurses, staff and local women.

The hospital had a great impact on the local economy. Monies from jobs at the hospital, spending by patients at local businesses and supply purchases from local stores ran close to \$1 million annually. This created an economic bond and a sense of community between the hospital

and the surrounding area.

In 1950, the Department of Defense ordered the closing of the hospital in a cost-cutting move but local protests and the Korean War ended the plan. The hospital continued to treat soldiers until 1974. In June of that year, the hospital closed, and its facilities handed over to a number of groups.

While Valley Forge General has not operated in more than 40 years it remains a powerful memory for the people of the area and for those servicemen it helped to restore to civilian life.

Here are some suggestions from the staff for preparing zucchini *that just keeps coming* from our local gardens and grocery stores.



Zucchini Bread (Muffins)

(submitted by Gail Habbersett)

- 3 eggs
- 1 cup veg oil
- 1 ½ cup sugar
- 2 cups peeled, grated zucchini
- 2 teaspoons vanilla
- 2 cups flour
- ¼ teaspoon baking powder
- 2 teaspoons baking soda
- 3 teaspoons ground cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup golden raisins
- 1 cup chopped walnuts, almonds or pecans

Preheat oven to 375°. Beat eggs lightly. Stir in oil, sugar, zucchini, and vanilla. Sift flour, baking powder, baking soda, cinnamon and salt onto waxed paper, then add to egg mixture. Stir in raisins and nuts. Spoon batter into well-greased 8x5 loaf pans. *Note metal pans do best.* Bake about 50 min. or until toothpick comes out clean. Now that we have downsized, I often make mega muffins or mini loaf pans and freeze them individually.

Lemon Zucchini Bread

(submitted by Sharon Kope)

I found this recipe while searching on Pinterest for different recipes for zucchini. This super flavorful and moist bread tastes great for dessert, as a

snack, or even for breakfast or brunch. It's very refreshing!

Servings: 12

Calories: 239 kcal

Ingredients

- 1 ½ cups all-purpose flour (or half white whole wheat flour)
- ½ teaspoon salt
- ½ teaspoon baking soda
- ½ teaspoon baking powder
- ¾ cup granulated sugar
- Zest of 1 large lemon
- 2 large eggs
- ½ cup oil (vegetable or canola oil)
- 1 ½ teaspoons fresh lemon juice
- 1 cup grated zucchini

Glaze:

- 1 cup powdered sugar
- 4 teaspoons fresh lemon juice

Instructions

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Grease and flour a 8 x 4 inch loaf pan. Set aside.

In a large bowl, whisk together the flour, salt, baking powder, and baking soda. In another bowl, combine sugar and lemon zest and stir well. Add eggs, oil, and lemon juice and stir until smooth. Stir in the dry ingredients until combined. Fold the zucchini into the batter and pour the batter into the prepared loaf pan.

Bake for 45-50 minutes, or until toothpick inserted in the center comes out

clean. Allow to rest in the pan for 10 minutes before removing the loaf onto a wire cooling rack to cool completely.

While the bread is cooling, make the glaze by combining the powdered sugar and lemon juice in a small bowl until smooth. Drizzle the glaze over the bread. Slice and serve.

Zucchini Brownies

(submitted by Louise O'Brien)

- 2 cups all-purpose flour
 - ½ cup cocoa powder
 - 1 ½ teaspoons baking soda
 - 1 teaspoon salt
 - ½ cup vegetable oil
 - 1 ½ cups sugar
 - 2 teaspoons vanilla extract
 - 2 cups shredded zucchini (1 large or 2 small zucchinis)
 - 3-5 tablespoons water (I did not use any water)
 - ½ cup chopped walnuts, optional
- For the frosting:**
- 3 tablespoons cocoa powder
 - ¼ cup butter, melted
 - 2 cups powdered sugar
 - ¼ cup milk
 - 1 tablespoon vanilla extract
 - Pinch of salt

Directions:

Preheat oven to 350°F. Line a 9x13" baking pan with foil and spray with cooking spray. Set aside. In a medium bowl, whisk together flour, cocoa, baking soda, and salt. Set aside. Using an electric mixer fitted


with a paddle attachment, mix together the oil, sugar, and vanilla until well combined. Add the dry ingredients and stir. Fold in the zucchini. Let the mixture sit for a few minutes so the batter can absorb the moisture from the zucchini. Then, if your mixture is still very powdery, add up to 5 tablespoons water (start with 1 tablespoon and work up from there, stirring well after each addition). The batter will be very thick but shouldn't be powdery. (It partially depends on how wet your zucchini is!) Add walnuts, if desired. You may need to use your hands to work the water in instead of a spoon. The dough is super thick, like cookie dough. Do not add too much water! Spread in prepared pan.

Bake 25-30 minutes until the brownies spring back when gently touched.

To make the frosting: Whisk butter, cocoa, salt, and powdered sugar. Whisk in milk and vanilla. Spread over cooled brownies. Cut into squares and chill to semi-set. The frosting hardens slightly on the top but stays wet and goey underneath. These brownies are best stored in an airtight container and eaten within 2 days. Chill them to make them last an extra day. They're what I call "fork" brownies because they are so goey.

NOTE People have been saying these brownies are cakey. Every time I've made them they turn out super fudgy like in the photos. The problem is how much water you add. It's hard to say how much to add because every time I've made these I've added a different amount. It really does depend on your zucchini. The batter will be very thick and need help spreading in the pan. If your batter is at all liquidly or thin you're going to get a cakeier brownie.

(\$2.00 with either sauerkraut, chili or both). We boarded the train for the 25 mile trip through the gorge up to While Haven. Of all the years I have spent in this area, I never knew that the gorge was so spectacular. Every bit as gorgeous as the Pennsylvania Grand Canyon (which I have also biked). Most of what we saw is not accessible, except to hikers, bikers or rafters.

Most of the passengers departed, while some stayed on for the return trip. We surveyed the trail (mostly hard packed gravel) and set out for our afternoon of the 26 mile return to Jim Thorpe. The grade is similar to that of the railroad and river, slightly downhill all the way. While riding along the river, we saw and waved to rafters on the Lehigh River, talked with other bikers and took breaks along the way at beautiful scenic

outposts. Beautiful waterfalls, cliffs rising out of the river and crossed the meandering train track, which led to the famous Packer "incline". This was used, back in the heyday of anthracite coal, which brought coal down from Tamaqua to the river to be transported to Bethlehem Steel, Philadelphia Electric and many homes. How many remember the coal being delivered to their homes and emptying the ash bin?

We ended the day back in Jim Thorpe which is known as the Swiss town of eastern US. For those who have never visited, the fall foliage season is the best, so reward yourself. You owe yourself the experience.

WOW, what a day. I hope we do it again this fall and more will join us.
