




FROM THE MAIN GATE

Unfortunately, there are times when we need to call 911 in order to receive emergency medical treatment. The following is information that you should know in order to ensure a quick response by emergency personnel, as well as proper care for you or your loved one:

When dialing 911, you will be asked for:

- 1. Your Name
- 2. Your Address
- 3. Your Township
- 4. Your Phone Number
- 5. A Cross-Street
 - a. Mill Road only for Springton, Newbury, and Eaton villages.
 - b. Hershey's Drive only for Westbrook Village
 - c. Mill Road or Chandler Drive for Kennett and Franklin villages.
 - d. Chandler Drive only for all other villages and all HM amenities below.
- 6. Type of Emergency (what is wrong?)
- 7. Age of the Patient

PLEASE NOTE THE FOLLOWING ADDRESSES FOR HM AMENITIES:

Community Center: 25 Hershey's Drive

Sullivan House: 35 Hershey's Drive Tennis Courts & Pool: 55 Hershev's Drive

Wood Shop: 45 Hershey's Drive

When emergency responders arrive at your house, you will be asked to provide:

- 1. Patient's Medical History (stroke, cardiac arrest, diabetes....etc
- 2. Patient's Current Medications
- 3. Patient's Allergies

- 4. Copy of the Patient's Living Will (if applicable)
- 5. Recollection of Events Leading Up to the Emergency
- 6. Hospital Preference (for transport)



NOTE: The emergency responders rely on the patient's feedback in order to administer the proper treatment. From time to

time, you may be asked if you can walk to the stretcher or ambulance. If at any time you feel that movement or walking would cause you undue discomfort or pain, explain to the emergency responders that you prefer not to walk and wish to be moved or lifted onto the stretcher.

We highly recommend making a list, or lists, containing answers to all of the necessary information listed above; and keep that list somewhere handy (purse, nightstand, kitchen counter, on the refrigerator....etc) so that emergency responders, friends, or family can easily find it in case of emergency. Also, please do not forget to update that list(s) with any changes.





TECHNOLOGY TIPS

Don Trauger | Kennett

Malwarebytes is a free anti-malware program. If you have it installed, the program should update itself automatically to the latest version 3.6.1. By the time you read this, the version number may be higher.

This program will detect and remove most malware that anti-virus programs miss. It's available at malwarebytes. com. Open your web browser and type malwarebytes.com in the address field and press the "Enter" key. Click the "Free Download" button at the

After you have deactivated the license, updating Malwarebytes free is manual. Click the tiny "up chevron" on the Taskbar (Windows 10) and double click the blue "M". When Malwarebytes opens, click the "Scan Now" button to start a system scan. This will also update

Malwarebytes before commencing the scan. You can also click the Desktop Malwarebytes icon to perform the update and scan as described above. Scanning should be done weekly or as needed.

Other program options can be found when you click "Settings" and by clicking the tabs at the top. However, I find

Malwarebytes Version 3.6.1

upper right of the Malwarebytes window to download. It comes with a 14 day free trial of its premium features.

Double click the "mb3-setup-consumer" file in your Downloads folder to install it. When the window opens click "Advanced Options" at the bottom and put a check next to "Create a desktop shortcut". Next, click "Agree and Install" and click "Finish" when the installation is complete. Click the "X" at the top of the pop-up window to close it which explains the 14 day free trial that starts now. Although Malwarebytes comes with the 14 day free trial, I recommend that you select the free version. To select the free version, click "Settings", then "Account Details" at the top and click "Deactivate Premium Trial". The reason for this is that Malwarebytes protection can interfere with your anti-virus program.

that the factory settings are appropriate for most users.

AdwCleaner, another anti-malware product, is a great compliment to Malwarebytes. It's good to have another assessment tool on your system and it's also available from the Malwarebytes webpage, malwarebytes.com/products/, in the lower right hand corner. Double click the AdwCleaner download button to open it and then click "Scan Now". Follow any screen prompts. There is no formal installation.

Please come to the PC Club meetings. We'll show you how to install and run Malwarebytes and AdwCleaner. Also, there will be time for your general questions. We meet on the **third Tuesday** of each month at 7 p.m. in the Ardmore Room on the first floor of the Community Center.

Do you like sushi? Do you ever have a craving for *good* sushi? Do you even know what sushi is?

Sushi is a Japanese dish of specially prepared vinegared rice, usually with some sugar and salt, combined with a variety of ingredients such as seafood and vegetables. Styles and presentation vary widely, but the key ingredient

is "sushi rice" wrapped with dry seaweed.

With all that said, the thought of eating sushi was never something I wanted to try. Eventually I decided to try just the vegetable sushi and found out I really enjoyed it.

Several weeks ago, five of us went to Mino Japanese Restaurant and Sushi Bar on Route 30. You can order items as you would in any other restaurant. They also offer 'all you can eat' for a set price; definitely a 'better bang for your buck'! Their only requirement is that you eat all you order.

We ordered a varied assortment of sushi, which we shared, and went back for seconds and thirds.

Mino's, www.minosushi.com, is located at 321 Lancaster Avenue in Malvern. They are open seven days a week – Monday through Friday from 11 a.m. to 10 p.m.; Saturday from noon to 10 p.m.; and Sunday from noon to 9:30 p.m. You can dine in or take out. It is also BYOB.

For several reasons, I would recommend Mino's highly if you are in the

mood for some good sushi. The restaurant is very bright and clean. The staff is very friendly and helpful. The price is right and it is very close to The Mill.

Joe Kennedy | Princeton

Like many artists, Thomas Hovenden painted people he knew. In doing so, the late 19th century local artist with a national reputation produced several



works that were extraordinary for

his time.

An Irishman who married into a prominent Quaker abolitionist family from Plymouth Meeting, Hovenden was among the first to paint African Americans not as caricatures but with sympathy and dignity.

During the 1880s, when his career was on the rise, Hovenden produced several remarkable story paintings portraying black Americans. Three of them are believed to portray Chloe and Sam Jones, neighbors of the artist in Plymouth Meeting, according to an exhibition brochure from the Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts. The couple were free people who came to Pennsylvania in 1849 from Maryland. Sam was a laborer; his wife, Chloe, worked at home raising their two children.

"Sunday Morning", completed in 1881, shows an aged black couple in a room of their ramshackle home. Critic Patricia Hills, in her book The Painters' America (1974), writes, "These old people are pictured as virtuous and


content with their lot."

In 1882, Hovenden completed two additional works with African American themes. The first, "Dem Was Good Ole Times", shows an old man looking out at the viewer with a banjo resting on a chair. "Beneath a poor tattered coat there is a spirit full of compassion," writes an unidentified critic in an exhibition pamphlet found in the library of the Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts. The second, "Chloe and Sam",



from the same year, depicts the everyday life of an elderly couple. According to the writer of an exhibition pamphlet, the painting "suggests hard work and character in the faces of the couple."

The last painting with this black story theme was "The Last Moments of John Brown", completed in 1884 to illustrate a John Greenleaf Whittier poem, John Brown of Ossawatomie." Dramatic in nature, it shows the abolitionist John Brown under heavy guard on his way to his



During this period, Hovenden was elected to the National Academy of Design in 1882 and succeeded Thomas Eakins as instructor at the Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts.

Born in 1840 in Dunmanway, County Cork, Hovenden was orphaned at age six. At 14, he was apprenticed to a frame carver and gilder. Impressed with Hovenden's skill, his master encouraged



him to enroll in the Cork School of Design.

In 1863, Hovenden immigrated to New York City, where he studied at the National Academy of Design. Then, like many artists of the time, he studied art in Paris. While in France, he painted works on Breton peasant life. In Brittany, he also met Helen Corson,

another art student. Corson came from one of the most prominent families in the Philadelphia region. Her father, Hiram Corson, was a leading medical doctor and uncompromising opponent of slavery.

When Hovenden returned to the United States in 1880, he and Corson married. The Plymouth Meeting barn that became his studio was once a stop on the Underground Railroad. His association with the Corson family

undoubtedly was a factor that led him to paint African Americans with deep feeling.

Hovenden is best known for two works that are often cited in American art history books: Breaking Home Ties (1890) and Bringing Home the Bride (1893).

At age 55, he was struck and killed by a train in Plymouth Township while trying to rescue a child.

Using the Villages in Florida as an example – "golf carts to the rescue". Did you know that between the entrance to the swimming pool and the stairs leading to the Community Center, we park 15 cars? Did you also know that 50 golf carts can fit in that same space?

Did you know that many of us, who have two cars, put less than 5,000 miles on them each year? Why so little? Because they are used to go to Giant and Rite Aid, and maybe an occasional trip to Exton or West Chesing lot that has so many uses. If we were a golf cart oriented community, the 15 to 50 ratio, as stated above, would have an immediate impact. If those who took bus trips used golf carts, there would be an immediate impact.



ter. The "family" car is used the rest of the time. Why can't we use a golf cart to go to Giant and Rite Aid? The answer is; it is illegal to take a cart out of "The Mill". Can that change? I would suggest it can and maybe the pipeline would pay for it.

Did you know there is a set of plans for using golf carts to go to Giant? Did you know that it was turned down because it would be considered dangerous for golf carts and cars to be in the same parking lot! Using this logic, it is even more dangerous for cars and pedestrians to be in the same parking lot! Let's outlaw pedestrians! Just think of the savings in gas, insurance, state inspection, license, maintenance and fumes if we had one car.

Now let's discuss the swimming pool parking lot issue; since this is the parkIf those who play tennis, pickleball and bocce used golf carts, there would be an immediate impact. If those who use the Recreation Center or Community Center used golf carts, there would be an immediate impact. The point being, there are many reasons to start the process of making "The Mill" golf cart oriented, not to mention the change in atmosphere; from a retirement community to a vacation oriented retirement community - "Play Where You Live."

Let's start by relining the parking lots: pool - replace 15 with 50; tennis/pickleball - 10 spots allocated for golf carts; Community Center - 20 spots. Make it convenient for golf cart users and as they say "build it and they will come".

Cider Cranberry Chili

2 tablespoons vegetable oil

2 pounds sirloin steak, cut to 1" cubes

½ pound ground chuck

12 ounces sweet sausage, casing removed and cut to 1/2" cubes

1 large yellow onion, chopped

5 garlic cloves, diced

¼ cup chili powder

½ tablespoon red chili flakes

¹/₄ cup Worcestershire sauce

21/4 teaspoons each cumin and dried basil

¼ cup scotch bonnet hot sauce

2 cans (15 oz. each) beef broth

2 cans (15 oz. each) peeled tomatoes

½ can (7 oz.) cranberry sauce

1/8 cup apple cider vinegar

1 cup chopped fresh cilantro

2 bay leaves

2 teaspoons kosher salt and black pepper, or to taste

In a heavy pot, brown sirloin in oil, then set aside. Brown ground beef, sausage, onion, and garlic. Return sirloin to pot, add all remaining ingredients, and bring to a boil. Reduce to a simmer, partially cover, and cook at least 2 hours. Remove bay leaves before serving, and season to taste if needed.

Meatless GF Chili

½ cup olive oil 5 garlic cloves, diced 2 Vidalia onions, chopped 1 red onion, chopped 4 jalapeño peppers, diced 2 habañero peppers, diced 1 each orange, yellow, and red bell

pepper, sliced

3 carrots, sliced into thin rounds

1 can (15 oz.) corn

1 can (15 oz.) each black, pinto, kidney, and garbanzo beans ½ cup red wine

4 large tomatoes, chopped

18 ounces of gluten-free beer

½ cup honey

8 scallions, chopped

½ cup fresh cilantro, chopped

1 teaspoon each black pepper, white pepper, celery salt, cumin, onion powder, and garlic powder

½ tablespoon kosher salt, or to taste

2 tablespoons chili powder

3 tablespoons sour cream, plus more for garnish

Chilly? Make Chili!

> In a heavy pot, lightly caramelize garlic, onions, peppers, and carrots in the oil. Add corn and beans and cook about 4 minutes stirring often. Add all remaining ingredients, bring near to a boil, then reduce to a simmer, partially cover, and cook at least 30 minutes. Serve with a dollop of sour cream.

Poultry Passion Chili

5 tablespoons canola oil

1 pound *each* boneless skinless chicken, chicken sausage, and ground turkey

3 large white onions, chopped

2 large celery ribs, diced

3 large green bell peppers, chopped

2 jalapeño peppers, diced

2 cloves garlic, diced

2 cans (15 oz. each) kidney beans

2 cups beef broth

1½ cans (15 oz. each) stewed tomatoes

1 can (6 oz.) tomato paste 2½ teaspoons chili powder

1 teaspoon each cayenne and black pepper, oregano, and kosher salt Green apple, diced, and sour cream

In a heavy pot, heat oil to medium high, then chop chicken and sausage and lightly brown them along with the turkey. Add onions, celery, peppers, and garlic and cook until all browned.

Add all remaining ingredients, bring to

a boil, then

for garnish



reduce to a simmer and cook uncovered for at least 1 hour. Serve with apple and sour cream garnish.

A Taste of Cuba Chili

½ cup vegetable oil

2½ pounds ground pork 2½ pounds ground sirloin

1 large white onion, diced

3 garlic cloves, minced

³/₄ cup chili powder

2 tablespoons cinnamon

2 tablespoons cumin

1 tablespoon each allspice, ground cloves, and tumeric

3½ tablespoons unsweetened cocoa powder

2 tablespoons granulated sugar

2 teaspoons brown sugar and salt

½ cup balsamic vinegar

2 cups brewed coffee

2 cups beef broth 3 cups crushed tomatoes 1½ quarts tomato juice 1 quart cooked black beans Grated Havarti cheese for garnish

In a heavy pot over medium heat, cook pork, beef, onion, garlic, chili powder, cinnamon, cumin, allspice, cloves, tumeric, cocoa, and sugars in the oil until meat is lightly browned. Add vinegar, coffee, broth, tomatoes, and juice and simmer for 45 minutes. Add beans and simmer 10 minutes more, then serve with Havarti garnish.

Blazing 3 Pepper Chili

1½ pounds hot Italian sausage, casing removed, chopped 1½ pounds ground chuck

1 large yellow onion, chopped

3 jalapeño peppers, diced

½ can (3 oz.) chipotle peppers in adobo sauce, diced

5 poblano peppers, diced

1 teaspoon each marjoram, dry mustard, cayenne pepper, kosher salt, and black pepper

2 tablespoons each chili powder, cumin, paprika, and spicy brown mustard

2 cans (15 oz. each) crushed tomatoes

Juice of 1 large lime 2 bottles of beer, lager preferred 3 tablespoons cornmeal Grated cheddar cheese for garnish

In a heavy pot, sauté sausage until a bit of fat renders, then add beef and cook until they are well browned. Add onion and cook until softened, then add peppers and spices and cook for 5 minutes. Add tomatoes, juice, and beer and simmer for 2 hours. Add cornmeal, adjusting as needed depending on how thick you like your chili, and simmer another

hour. Serve with cheddar garnish.
