From The Village President

This time of year gives us all a chance to reflect on the previous twelve months and assess our progress. In Inverness we have many things to celebrate and be thankful for. One of the most visual activities in the Village is the siding project on the houses. Sam Crispin and Dave DeNight have been excellent both in their supervision of the project and also in their communication with individual neighbors as well as with the entire Village. Also, kudos must go out to Braulio Construction and his entire crew. They have handled this project with a professionalism and caring that are not always represented in the construction field. The project, as noted by Sam and Dave, is on budget and on schedule.

Some other work that has been happening in Hershey's Mill has been reported by the Master Association. Through the funding by the Vision Quest Campaign (those funds derived by the purchase of properties in the Mill) the Master Association has invested approximately 4.2 million dollars over the last seven years in infrastructure improvements throughout the entire community. These improvements include everything from completion of the walking trail to renovations to the recreation area, community center, pool, Sullivan House, garden area and wood shop. We are fortunate that we have so many individuals contributing their talents to these important items.

I would be remiss if I did not thank the Inverness council members who have worked tirelessly throughout this last year. In addition to our regular meetings, we have also tackled a complete revision of the Rules and Regulations of Inverness Village. Our goal is to have a first draft completed by Q1 2023. Vice President Penny Zimmerman has taken on the job of monitoring our water consumption in the Village and is keeping excellent records of

Landscape Committee Report

The Landscaping Committee checked most of our to-do list this year. The dead/diseased/ declining tree removal continues; highlights are the removal of diseased oaks at 717, 718 and 755. Tree and shrub planting added sweet bay magnolia, birch, arborvitae, inkberry, oak leaf hydrangea, spice bush, chokeberry, a low growing sumac and muhly grass across our Village.

The Clipper Brigade met three times plus Sam's initial trimming. This saved our Village hundreds of dollars in landscaping work because we cut, bagged and stacked seven heaping pickup-truck loads of dead tree limbs that were later hauled away by HM Landscape (HML). We will call out the Clipper Brigade again in the spring to work in other neglected spots in our village.

Aeration and reseeding of the front yards occurred in the fall. HML also treated our grassy areas to kill invasive brown nut sedge and stilt grass. These two treatments will likely become annual treatments to maintain our lawns. And our final goal was to begin tackling the problem of dense groundcover masking foundation grading erosion and wet basement. We have decided on a joint process of groundcover removal followed by the Maintenance Committee correcting the grading and topping the soil with rocks to prevent new erosion and regrowth of groundcover. Our 2023 budget breaks out the funds dedicated to this work. We will begin with houses experiencing problems, then move on to the houses with dense groundcover along the foundation. This work will be accomplished over several years. HML will be tasked with removal of any regrowth in the rock border as part of their contracted weed removal work.

Harlan Tree Service and ACTrees handled our tree removals. We are pleased with their work and will continue to use them next year. The committee is actively interested in reviewing our options for other landscaping companies as contract renewal approaches in 2023. It is possible that we would divide the contract into turf management and woody plant care to build on the strengths of our current experts. A new operations director has been hired at HML and we will see how he changes things in the coming year.

The Landscaping Committee welcomes new members. Horticultural experience is not required. Most of the work of the committee is prioritizing and planning the work our contractors perform throughout the year. Please consider joining us.

Inverness Siding Update

This siding update is provided to those who could not attend the December Community Meeting. As of this date, Braulio Construction, LLC has completed the renovations on 26 of our Village homes. Painting has been done on 17 homes within the Village. So far, the project is on schedule and on budget. Based on comments from homeowners with completed homes, they are extremely pleased with the look of their homes.

The thing that stands out to me as the greatest benefit of the project is not that we are replacing siding and painting our houses, but that we are taking care of other maintenance and safety issues in our community. This project has required us to take an in-depth look at our houses and related construction issues. Braulio has pointed out several issues related to decks and electric panels that might have had catastrophic consequences if not addressed. In some cases, these issues were taken care of through the siding project with no additional expense to the maintenance budget. This is the main reason our maintenance budget has had very little use this year.

Here are some of the questions that were asked during the annual meeting:

Q. What is the current status of the contract?

A. We are on track to complete the contract on time and on budget. The construction will slow down during the coldest winter months due to limitations of installing the Hardie Board and painting. Braulio and his crew will take a break during these months and will resume construction when the weather allows.

Q. Why isn't my house painted?

A. Painting can only be done when the weather cooperates with us. Bottom line . . . It is too cold to paint. Braulio will continue painting our houses when the temperatures increase.

Q. They removed my gutters and downspouts but didn't put enough nails in them when they were re-hung. Are they going to fall off my house?

A. The answer is No. Braulio is using brackets on our gutters that are hidden inside the gutter. You will see some of the nail holes from when they were originally hung, but be assured, the gutters are attached well to our houses.

Q. Is this work being inspected?

A. Yes, the work is being inspected by East Goshen Township and by Sam Crispin and Dave DeNight. Dave and Sam are your "go-to" people in the community. If you have questions about the project, you can come to us. Dave has walked this project almost every day and has documented the project as it progresses. We are working with Braulio to make sure all small issues (punch list items) have been completed before they move to phase two of our project.

Q. It looks like Braulio is running out of materials. Will they have enough to complete the job?

A. The answer is Yes. By the time you read this, Braulio will have ordered and have in place, the materials to work on the next section of houses.

We appreciate the continued support from our community and look forward to phase two of the project. We will let the community know when construction will resume.

How the Hershey's Mill Villages Got Their Names

The October issue of the *Inverness "I"* included a trivia quiz with questions about our local area. One of the questions we had planned to use was *What are the Hershey's Mill Villages named for?* Someone had once told me that they were all named after golf courses in the UK, but I was not sure if that was correct. So I posed the question to Ed McFalls, the HM Homeowner's Association Managing Agent, who responded with a detailed explanation of how our villages were named.

Thanks to Ed for sharing this fascinating history of our villages. Here is how our villages were named, in Ed McFalls' own words.

Various sources. No specific policy.

Many villages were locations (not golf courses) in the UK – Ashton, Brighton, Chatham, Devonshire, Eaton, Merrifield, Newbury, Ulster.

Franklin was after Ben Franklin.

Glenwood - built in a wooded area.

Heatherton after Bob Wooldridge's eldest daughter Heather. (Editor's Note: Bob Wooldridge was President of Wooldridge Construction, which built many of the HM Villages.)

Inverness - golf course

Jefferson - the president

Kennett - local township in southern CC

Lincoln - the president

Oakmont - golf course

Princeton - university/town in NJ

Quaker - PA religious sect

- Robynwood Bob Wooldridge's younger daughter Robyn.
- Springton just made it up

Troon - golf course

Vassar - the college

Westbrook - wanted to call it Waterview, but East Goshen said NO because of Waterview Apts on WC Pike so I named it after a street in my boyhood neighborhood in West Goshen

Yardley - town in Bucks County





Zephyr - I picked it for the meaning "gentle breeze" and when I asked Bob Wooldridge if that was OK, he had a "Zephyr" bottled water on his desk so thought it was meant to be.

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













Roger Schreiner – Scroll Sawing By Jim Aubry

I had an interesting visit with our neighbor Roger Schreiner (701) to discuss his hobby of scroll sawing. Roger grew up in a family of carpenters, but other than helping his father and uncles occasionally, he didn't follow in their footsteps. He spent his career in the world of finance. However, once he retired, he was drawn back to the world of woodworking – scroll sawing to be specific.

I have seen this type of work but never looked closely nor considered what was involved in the process. The requirements include a scroll saw, wood, practice, and patience. Roger said the best wood to work with is actually commercial flooring. The process involves finding a picture he likes, attaching the picture to the wood of his choice, and then carefully cutting the picture out of the wood. The end product could be a 3-D image, a silhouette, or a puzzle. I viewed examples of each, and his work is phenom-



enal. The Schreiners spend a lot of time at their place in Lake George, New York, and that is where he does most of his work. He told me that at the cabin, he has scroll saw cut-outs of his whole family.

An interesting fact that Roger shared with me is that his family name, Schreiner, means carpenter in German. I guess scroll sawing was meant to be!
