I also want to congratulate the whole Inverness community for your outstanding participation in the two recent elections that have taken place in the Village. The first one was for the siding project. A total of 88% of Village owners voted in that election. Regardless of how you voted, you deserve kudos for participating. The second election was for Village council members. Again, a great turnout of 74% voted. Those who were voted in were Ed Isselmann and Marilyn Foley, both reelected for a second term, and Terry Marran for a first term. The officers for your council are:

The recent siding project vote, which was overwhelmingly approved, has brought forth multiple questions which may have been answered previously during meetings or in written communications, but deserve attention here as well to clarify the issue. On the next page are some of the more frequently asked questions with answers.

President's Letter *(Cont'd)*

Question 1: Who will be supervising the project?

Answer: **Sam Crispin** (703) and **Dave DeNight** (722) will be doing the general overall supervision of the project. (Thank you for this effort!)

Question 2: Who is going to assess the extent of the repairs? What happens in the case of a disagreement between the house owner and the contractor?

Answer: The homeowner should work directly with Sam Crispin and Dave DeNight. If there is a disagreement, Sam and Dave will work directly with the contractor. The homeowner should not put him or herself in the middle between the contractor and the Village contact persons.

Question 3: I understand that the work might start in the annex. Where will work proceed?

Answer: Yes. The work is expected to commence in the annex as a model for all to see. After that, it is up to the contractor to proceed in the most efficient and effective manner to complete the project on schedule.

Question 4: Will the homeowners be informed ahead of time of the extent of the repairs?

Answer: Ongoing emails will go out to the community regarding the progress. These emails will let the Village know when the contractor will be working in their area. This will more than likely be done via emails to those involved.

Question 5: What happens if someone does not pay for the project?

Answer: It is hoped that all owners will follow the Inverness tradition of having one of the best villages with regard to low default rates from owners. That being said, we understand that this is a significant special assessment. Should an owner become delinquent on their payment to the Village, there will be formal procedures that will be followed. These could include written notification to the owner to see if there is a unique situation that can be resolved, late charges, interest payments, legal fees as well

as recording fees. These costs would be recorded as a lien against the property. This would legally need to be satisfied prior to legal transfer of the property to another owner.

I hope this has helped answer many questions that may or may not have been asked regarding this very important topic. If you have any other questions, please feel free to contact any of your council members.

Village Meeting Recap

The annual Village election meeting was held June 2nd in the Community Center and was well attended. Retiring President **Boyd Mackleer** called the meeting to order and recognized new resident **Iris Barcaro** (751).

He followed with a brief overview of items under consideration by the Hershey's Mill Board of Directors. He then turned the meeting over to **Ed Isselmann** for committee reports.

Richard Hammock's Treasurer's report noted that we have \$292K in the reserve fund. This later prompted a discussion as to what comes out of the reserve fund and what out of the maintenance fund. During the discussion it was noted that a new roof costs \$15K.

Sam Crispin, chair of the siding committee, noted the 85% favorable vote for the project, and said they were anxious to get the contractor, Braulio, started as soon as the funds are in hand. Work will start in the "Magnificent Seven," aka the annex.

Barb Crispin gave an extensive landscape report which is included elsewhere in this issue. She encouraged volunteers for her once-a-month Clipper Brigade which is working to beautify the Village.

Jim Aubry relayed **Pat Aubry's** (Social Committee Facilitator) request for more volunteers for the Social Committee. The Holiday Gala is set for Saturday, December 10th.

Carl Griffin, Maintenance chair, noted there were no severe rain storm issues so far this year. Gutter cleaning will come in late June.

Becky Green, Architect Chair, noted that the Architecture Committee is working on updating the rules and regs relative to that area. **Judy Klanderman** noted that specifying awning colors can be challenging. Becky also noted that solar lights might be considered for the Village signs.

Candidates for the open council positions were introduced and the election held. **Ed Isselmann**, **Marilyn Foley**, and **Terry Marran** were elected.

Jim Aubry repeated his plea for drivers to proceed slowly past garages that open directly onto the roadway. Speed presents a real hazard for those leaving such garages.

Tribute: At the end of the meeting a short tribute was given to Boyd. He was presented with a gift and sizable thank you card signed by many residents. He was also presented with a framed decoration from CSK.

How HOAs Work

For many of us, our move into Hershey's Mill was our first experience with a Homeowners Association (HOA), Master Association (MA), and Village Council – entities with which we are now dealing.

In an effort to provide a bit of clarity, I sat down with Boyd Mackleer, our retiring council president, who has served not only on the Village council, but also as a member, as well as president, of the Master Association. This article will speak in generalities. Should anyone have any specific questions regarding "who does what to whom," please get in touch with a member of our Village Council.

The Master Association is made up of the presidents of each of the villages. The MA has a board of directors made up of seven of these presidents, voted on by the rest of the MA membership. This organization is responsible for issues outside the confines of the villages including the community center, sports complex, gardens, and the library among other items.

When a new resident goes to closing on their home purchase here, some of the funds collected go to Hershey's Mill. A portion goes to the MA to be used for capital projects and sewer. The rest of these funds go to the village. Currently, this amount cannot exceed the quarterly HOA fee. These village funds are used for such things as roofs, siding, roads, etc. Should anyone have any questions about these funds, please contact Janet Burgess at CSK.

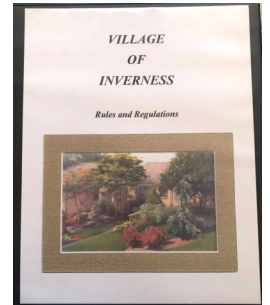
Among other things, the MA has responsibility for security and amenities. Our Village is responsible for items directly related to Inverness: snow removal, roofs, and siding, for example. As Boyd described it to me, if you took our homes, turned them upside down and shook them, we as homeowners are responsible for everything that falls out, and Inverness is responsible for the building that we shook!

Once again, our first experience as a member of an HOA can be confusing, but rest assured, our funds are being put to good use.

Message from the Council Coordinator

This last year council has been reminded time and time again the importance of having the Inverness Village Rules and Regulations current. We have made preliminary revisions. Council will review the information along with committee chairs, finalize the changes and create an updated document. A copy of that document will be sent to all homeowners to be inserted in their binders for future reference. We hope to have the project completed by this fall.



For the last several months, we have been working on designs to replace the Inverness Village signs. They are just about standing. With input from council, the architectural committee and a graphic designer (Brandit Signs), the new signs will be installed this summer. The number signs identifying the location of our units will also be replaced. The wooden posts holding up the large Village signs are rotted, chains are rusted through and leaning. The posts on the smaller signs are also rotted, and the wood pieces with the numbers cannot be repaired. The new signs will be carved and made from a stronger and more durable type compressed wood product that will need little maintenance and have a 10-year warranty. They will give the Village a modern updated look that will complement the new siding.

Once the siding project begins, I have agreed to work with **Louise DeNight** and our project managers, **Sam Crispin** and **Dave DeNight**, to provide residents with brief progress reports on the status of the work. Louise has also volunteered to keep a running record on the status of our work log. She will also inspect the completed projects to insure the homeowner is satisfied with the work.

I would like to thank those of you who voted for me in the recent election. It has been an honor to serve this community and I have enjoyed the opportunity. I will continue to work diligently with council to maintain positive change.

Landscape Committee Report

Happy Summer, Villagers. I hope you are enjoying walks around the Village. We live in a lovely neighborhood.

Your Landscaping Committee is actively working to tidy up Inverness. So far this year we have arranged for replanting trees and shrubs at houses that had removals in 2021. One tree stump was removed, the area leveled and topped with grass seed. If there is a spot in your section that needs a stump removed or converting mulched bed to grass, let us know.

Our next focus is on tree removal. Diseased and declining oaks and evergreens are being prioritized for removal this year and next. The declining ornamental trees are also being prioritized for removal with replanting where possible. We will attempt to replace a few of them every year until the entire Village has healthy front-yard trees. Autumn will be the next opportunity to do this as the budget allows.

The poor condition of our lawn in various places has been a topic of conversation within the Village. The Landscaping Committee is evaluating several options to diminish bare spots under trees and on the shady sides of buildings. Once the plan is refined, we will share it here in a future report. The bare spots and ruts caused by the mowers will continue to be monitored and be repaired at the end of the mowing season by HMLD.

We are also looking for more recruits. The CB meets about once a month and works for no more than 2 hours. We cut dead limbs, rake up debris, and bag or pile it all for HMLD to pick up. Email Barbara to be added to the email alert each time. There is no expectation that recruits can work each time and any help is appreciated, even a half hour.

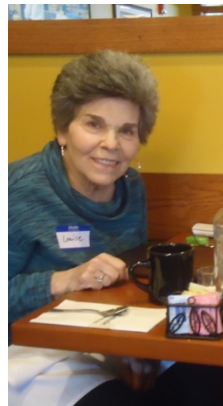

Things to Do in West Chester

Downtown West Chester, a national historic district, is a charming area with brick sidewalks, tree-lined streets, shops and boutiques, art galleries, a variety of restaurants, and buildings of various architectural styles. On a recent Saturday evening I dined outside on Gay Street in West Chester, enjoying the **Open Air Market** which will run this year through Labor Day.



The **Open Air Market** is one of the silver linings resulting from the pandemic, when indoor dining was not possible. Three blocks of Gay Street are closed to traffic in the summer from Friday until Sunday, and the street is filled with tables for outdoor dining. What a delight to stroll the borough with a friend, observe the people, and listen for a while to a band situated at one end of the road. We dined at **Teca**, one of our favorite restaurants, but there are many good places to dine in the borough – not only on Gay Street, but also on the cross roads and Market Street too. Due to the need for emergency vehicles to have access if needed, these other roads remain open to traffic.

The borough of West Chester has a number of places worthy of a visit, including:

- The **Uptown! Knauer Performing Arts Center**, 226 N. High Street, is housed in an old Armory built in 1916, and has a 327 seat theater. Uptown! promotes cultural, economic and civic life experience through theater, music, dance, speeches, and other events. uptownwestchester.org
- The **Chester County History Center (CCHC)** is across the street at 225 N. High Street. Founded in 1893, it contains exhibits of artifacts, manuscripts, photographs, and works of art that showcase life in our region from the 1600s to the present day. The CCHC also sponsors special events and walking tours. mycchc.org
- The **West Chester Growers Market**, at the corner of North Church and West Chestnut Streets, is open Saturdays from 9 AM to 1 PM. You will find fresh produce, breads, jams, honey, plants and flowers and much more, all from local sources. westchestergrowersmarket.com

While it's pleasing to take a daily walk through our beautiful Hershey's Mill, for a change of scenery visit one of our lovely nearby parks.

- **East Goshen Park**, on Paoli Pike, has a paved walking path, ball fields, tennis and pickleball courts, and a recently renovated playground. Concerts and township events are often held here. Across the street is Applebrook Park with 3 miles of walking paths. <https://eastgoshen.org/park-and-rec/>
- **West Goshen Park** contains an amphitheater, a playground, tennis courts, ball fields, and a paved walking path that circles the park. Check the website for Sunday evening concerts. westgoshen.org

And last but not least, when your grandchildren come to visit, entertain them at these fun places:

- **Treehouse World** – Only a 6-minute drive from Hershey's Mill, **Treehouse World**, 1442 Phoenixville Pike, is much more than just treehouses. Other activities include a zipline, trampoline, walk the plank, tree climbing, small animal mini-farm, and more. It's best suited for children ages 5 to 12, but adults are able to join in the fun too! Mornings are often busy, so visit in the afternoon for shorter wait times. Advance ticket purchase recommended. treehouseworld.com
- The **American Helicopter Museum** provides an educational and hands-on experience of helicopter history for children and adults. Visitors can climb in a helicopter and try out the controls. Contains over 35 civilian and military helicopters. <https://americanhelicopter.museum/>

NEVER ENDING – JUST EVOLVING

A Tribute to our own Boyd Mackleer - a volunteering continuum !

June 2nd marked a significant change in Inverness Village governance, and the start of a new phase of Boyd's ongoing volunteer efforts for Hershey's Mill. For most of us he has always been the president of the Village Council, and a commanding force thereon. Many of us assumed that, like the Supreme Court justices, this was, for Boyd, a life-time position which would only end when the Grim Reaper appeared.

Therefore we were quite surprised when the Village Council election announcement arrived from CSK informing one and all that Boyd had elected not to stand for reelection. For those who have lived here for an extended period of time, and being accustomed to Boyd as president of the council, this was truly an unexpected turn of events.

Tracing Boyd's life history, it is obvious that he has a strong interest in volunteering and a well-honed ability to rise to the top of any organization in which he is involved. In addition to stints on the trustee board of his church, and on the board of the West Chester Senior Center, heading association councils has been his contribution for years.

He has been on condominium/homeowner association councils off and on (mostly on) since 1982, with such service at Aspenwood Condominiums in Exton, and Brighton Village and Inverness in Hershey's Mill. In all cases Boyd quickly rose to head the council, and his total service as president covers 30 years, the last 22 of which have been right here in Inverness.

Knowing Boyd's volunteering nature, it is not surprising that he has been a member of the Master Association Board of Directors since 1997, during which time he has served terms as president. A significant role was overseeing the Transition Committee as the management of Hershey's Mill was transferred from Robert (Bob) Wooldridge to its present status as a non-profit organization.



As you can see, Boyd has been an important presence both here in Inverness and on the overall Hershey's Mill scene. He has faced many challenges and projects during his reign, perhaps the most obvious of which is the new facades which greatly improved our garages.

For his 22 years heading our Village he was Mr. Village Council, the one we went to with our questions, needs, and concerns. We always found him pleasant and communicative, and willing to take time to listen. It was with his blessing that this newsletter came into existence in 2010, and he has supported it ever since.

Knowing his well-honed ability to engage in friendly conversation without disclosing details you might be curious about, it was not surprising that during our interview he did not give a single specific reason for retiring from the Village Council at this time. Perhaps allowing for time with Judy's and his 8 grandchildren and 10 great-grandchildren was an understandable motivation.
