# From The Village President

In a recent publication from my church there was a passage called "A Prayer for Growing Old Gracefully". The first verse is:

Lord, Thou knowest better than I myself that I am growing older and will someday be old. Keep me from the fatal habit of thinking I must say something on every subject and on every occasion.

With that in mind I will try to keep my subjects to a few and my words even fewer.

This is the time of year when our thoughts turn towards the approaching two seasons that many love and hate...fall and winter. It is also the time of year that we must start looking seriously at our village budget. The current year has proven to be both healing and happier than the previous two as a result of the pandemic. But it has also proven to be a more expensive year. Almost everything has increased in cost and many items continue to increase regularly, e.g., gas. One of the increases that is greatly anticipated at the time of this writing is a significant increase in the landscaping budget. Our contract with Hershey's Mill Landscape Division (HMLD) expires 12/31/23. Currently there are, I believe, twenty villages that use HMLD. At the current time, every homeowner in those villages is paying approximately \$91.00/month for their services. A number of us in Inverness are talking with other villages and in particular those villages that use contractors other than HMLD. Although those conversations at this writing are inconclusive, it appears that any landscape service outside of HMLD will be more costly than HMLD. Why? The answer is volume.

# From The Village President (cont'd)

Even with twenty villages, HMLD has a very difficult time retaining a necessary number of employees, despite significant pay increases. In addition to increases in pay, HMLD is faced with significant increases in materials and equipment. This is not unique to HMLD and is mirrored throughout the landscape industry. More updates as additional information is collected.

On another note, I cannot tell you how many times I have been told by those outside of our village how attractive Inverness is. This has been enhanced significantly by the siding project. Each of us has also realized incredible increases in our property value both because of market situations and because of our continued effort to maintain our village. It is hoped that we will continue to do this in the future. That being said, another item that is frequently discussed among the council members and other village volunteers is future planning. We are constantly monitoring our infrastructure as well as listening to the concerns of our owners. Various items that require constant scrutiny are our roofs, walkways, roadways, sanitary sewer system, as well as our storm water management system. None of these are low ticket items. When a repair or replacement is needed, we are talking about many thousands of dollars.

Although we are not yet where we need to be financially to tackle another major project right now, we are headed in the right direction with our reserve fund being at its highest in many years. Each of you needs to be thanked for this as a result of your continued financial support. We are attempting to form a Long-Range Planning Committee whose job would be to analyze these individual components of our infrastructure, propose a plan of time and action and present a fiscal blueprint for funding these improvements. Please consider offering your services to this committee if you believe you have talent that can be used. You may contact any council member for additional information.

The closing verse of the above noted prayer is as follows:

Keep me reasonably sweet, for a sour old person is one of the crowning works of the devil. Give me the ability to see good things in unexpected places and talents in unexpected people, and give, O Lord, the grace to tell them so.

# **Landscape Committee Report**

The end of summer is the time for the Landscaping Committee to get a renewed focus on our next projects. We have funds in our budget for tree work, regrading foundations and general landscaping projects. Once again we will work to finish projects started in the spring by reseeding areas and planting replacement shrubs and trees. Each foundation regrading project is unique and some are not obvious, easy fixes. We have completed several with villagers reporting the leaks have stopped; several others are improved, but water during the heaviest rain still finds a way in. We will continue to add houses to the list requiring attention. Please let CSK know if you discover runoff has found an entry point.

Harlan responded to an emergency tree removal request. The leaning pine tree behind 773 had lost roots and was beginning to pull out of the ground after each hard rain. We want to track this type of tree movement. Please contact CSK if you notice a tree beginning to lean so we can monitor the situation.

At the time of this article's submission, HMLD had not come through to perform the annual shrub trimming and general clean up. This is contracted work and it will be completed as the trimming crew works its way around the villages. We lost our momentum in arranging new projects when the assistant operations manager left HMLD in late spring. The notes taken at the walk through are available and will be reviewed for the coming year.
