From The Village President

It is truly hard to believe that summer is officially over, and fall has begun! Our surroundings remind us of the beautiful time of year we are in and also of what is ahead...brrrrr! In this communication with our Inverness residents. I'd like to discuss three items: Hershey's Mill Master Association updates, the Inverness Work Log Report and Council business.

The Hershey's Mill Master Association generally meets on the first Thursday of each month. Those in attendance are the village council presidents or an appointed representative of the village as well as Ed McFalls, Managing Agent for Hershey's Mill. Various items are on the agenda. In the two most recent meetings (August and September) the major discussion points revolved around storm water management and 2023 budget planning.

With regard to storm water management, there is considerable work that has been done and more to come. It is difficult to talk in finite terms with regard to this project since water is such a fluid subject (pun intended). The area across Hershey's Drive from the Community Center has been converted into a water retaining area to both direct and reduce the speed of water runoff from the Westbrook Village area. That village sustained major water damage last year. Also, there has been considerable work done under Chandler Drive near Springton Village again to reduce the speed of storm water runoff.

This year, more attention is being paid to the villages of Jefferson and Ashton to reduce the possibility of severe flooding. Also, attention is being paid to some underground pipes going through Yardley which have either shifted in their pitch or partially collapsed, thereby affecting their integrity. As a result of these measures which must be addressed now, the Master Association has decided to temporarily table the expansion of the Community Center.

Once the storm water management situation is remedied, discussion on the expansion can continue.

As far as the 2023 HM Master Association budget is concerned, quotes and pricing are being gathered by the finance committee and should be presented at the next HMMA meeting on Thursday, October 6th.

On another note, I wanted to review the process for work orders in Inverness Village. If a homeowner believes work needs to be done that falls under the Inverness HOA, a call can be made to CSK Management Company at 610-337-3500, or an email sent to info@cskmgmt.com. The owner will be advised if a written Action Form is required. Then a representative of the Inverness Maintenance Committee should assess the property to determine if the requested work fits the responsibility that is outlined on the Maintenance Chart found on pages 29, 30 & 31 of the Village of Inverness Rules and Regulations. If it is the Village HOA's responsibility, then the degree of urgency will be addressed by the Maintenance Committee. While this is happening, a liaison for the Maintenance Committee (Louise DeNight) will attempt to contact the owner and will keep them informed of the status of the work order. I really want to thank Louise for taking on this role which greatly helps owners feel more aware of what is happening. Over the last five years, over 800 individual projects have been recorded on this log with the great majority of them completed. Our goal is to continue to address these concerns, but more importantly to keep the owners informed of the status of their request.

Finally, I have been asked to address two comments in the last Inverness "I". The article "How HOAs Work" was extremely helpful and on target. But elaboration is needed. The one described homeowner's responsibility as "...if you took our homes, turned them upside down and shook them, we as homeowners are responsible for everything that falls out...". This is a good visual, but Council would like to point out that this seems to describe personal property rather

than real property from insurance terms. In addition to what falls out, owners are responsible for the entire interior structure from the end of the studs inward. So items such as drywall, interior framing, flooring, etc., would be the owner's responsibility, not the village HOA. The other item is more of an update to a statement. With regard to the Capital Contribution paid at settlement by new owners to the Inverness Village HOA, the article stated "Currently, this amount cannot exceed the quarterly HOA fee." This had been the case. However, in 2021, Council voted to increase that amount to two times the quarterly assessment effective January 1, 2022.

In closing, I want to thank all of those in our Village who work tirelessly by contributing their talents to help make Inverness Village an even better community than it already is. Please know that regardless of how small you may think your effort or talent could impact our Village, it will always be welcomed! Please volunteer!

The next Inverness open meeting is Thursday, December 1, at 7 p.m. I hope to see you all there.

Siding Project Update

As most, if not all of you know by now, our exterior siding project is underway. Over the last couple of months, the Braulio Construction Company has been hard at work replacing siding and making repairs to our homes that was similar to the work that was originally done on the garages. The scope of work so far has been about what we had anticipated with some homes requiring more replacement of materials and other homes not as much. This pattern is due to the fact that some homes are exposed to harsh weather and constant sun exposure. All homes are being thoroughly inspected and any rotted or compromised wood is being replaced from the top of the home to the ground level. This work is being monitored and inspected by East Goshen Township to make sure all work is in compliance. The finished homes will have no structural or cosmetic rot and will be in the best condition to last for many years to come. Our plan is to inspect the homes every couple of years to stay ahead of repairs and then repaint within an 8 to 10 year interval.

Braulio's team has completed construction of the Annex homes and is currently working their way down Inverness Drive. The homes in the Annex area are presently being painted and when that work is completed, we will invite any community residents to come to the Annex homes to see the completed work. It is our hope that this completion of the Annex homes will be in the next couple of weeks, weather permitting of course. Our goal over the next couple of months is to continue to take advantage of good weather to keep the momentum going! We will continue to communicate updates about the progress being made to our homes as needed. When it is time for your house to be worked on, a letter will appear in your mailbox informing you that work will start on your section of houses. Architectural Committee Report

The Architectural Committee works only when a request is received. We would like to request that neighbors who submit Architectural Request Forms (as required), and have the work done, do not make changes after the plans have been submitted and approved. The committee does not want to become a "police committee" and certainly does not want to have to enforce rules when original plans have not been followed and the work is completed. Examples of this would be shrubbery around propane tanks, door colors, among others.

Council Coordinator Report

As summer comes to an end, we begin a new season. With each new season comes change. Many changes are occurring in Inverness. Houses are looking bright and beautiful with siding repairs and paint. Another welcome change is the installation of new Village signs. After investigating the possibilities of refurbishing the

existing signs, it was evident that the old signs were impossible to save. The wood rot and termite infestation solidified the decision to replace the



signs. To that end, we now have new modern looking signs made from thick composite material, with deep carved lettering needing little maintenance. The base color of the sign is the same grey as the siding, the letters are painted Inverness red.

New lighting is also part of this project. With the help of Bruce Yeager and Dave DeNight, the issue with the electric source will be corrected. Both Dave and Bruce have spent hours solving this problem. Once we get the signs illuminated, we will have a lighting ceremony!

Another part of the project is the re-landscaping of the areas around the signs. Barbara Crispin has agreed to prepare a plan.

Thank you to Bruce, Dave and Barbara for all their help in getting this project completed.

Landscaping Committee Report

Please allow me to start my report with a personal thanks to Villagers who kept newly planted shrubs and trees alive during our hot and dry summer. Your efforts are much appreciated.

The arrival of October weather sets the stage for landscaping projects to begin. The removal of dead and declining trees is underway with requests for bids sent out in September. We focused on a handful of tall oaks situated close to homes and parking spaces. As funds allow we will select other trees that are also a threat to property. Individual homeowners will be called prior to the work crew's arrival. Our goal is to work our way to a healthy tree canopy by removal and replanting.

HM Landscaping completed the annual shearing of shrubs in August. The trimming of branches brushing roofs and removal of dead shrubs is the next step of contracted work. A follow up report will be sent when this work is completed.

The Clipper Brigade will continue to meet in October and November to clear the lowest dead branches from trees in our Village. Volunteers are always welcome. Contact me for more details. The September work day focused on trees in the common area between 748 and 749. See page 10 for a photo of the group.

The committee thanks Marilyn Foley for working with us to complete the Village sign replacement project. Shrubs and perennial plants will be planted at each Chandler Road location to enhance the attractive new signs.

Men's Luncheon



Share the Road!

We have no sidewalks or driveways in Inverness Village. Therefore, it is extremely important that we share the road and take precautions to ensure the safety of all those on the road. Here are a few things to keep in mind.

Unless you are loading or unloading your car or running into the house for just a minute, please park your car in designated parking spaces and not in the roadway. We are fortunate to have plenty of parking in Inverness. Please use our parking spaces.

Walk opposing traffic - the shoulder on the left side of the road...facing oncoming traffic, as this allows drivers and pedestrians alike a much better opportunity to see the other approaching. If you will be walking around dusk or after dark, wear bright-colored clothing (reflective, if possible) and carry a flashlight, in order to make yourself more visible to motorists.

Ride (bicycles, golf carts, etc.) with traffic - on the right hand side of the road - and follow all traffic rules.

The speed limit in Inverness Village is 15 mph. Keep in mind that we have "blind spots" (corners where there are shrubs or trees that obstruct view, residents backing out of garages directly into the roadway). It is critical that motorists abide by the 15 mph speed limit. Please slow down!

Pedestrians should use extra caution and be aware that drivers may have a difficult time seeing them. Just because a pedestrian notices the vehicle coming toward them does not mean that the driver has also seen the pedestrian.

Pedestrians and motorists alike should always use caution when sharing the roadways within all of Hershey's Mill! All people (pedestrians and operators of automobiles, golf carts, bicycles...etc.) utilizing Hershey's Mill roadways and walkways are required to abide by the traffic rules and regulations of Hershey's Mill.

Let's all do our part to ensure the safety of all residents and visitors.

HOW MONEY COMES AND GOES AT HERSHEY'S MILL

An unofficial version

An insight into the operations of our community can be gained by following the published minutes of the HM Master Association (MA) and the Board of Directors (BD) thereof. The latter are particularly interesting as the board is where planning is done and future projects originated.

From time to time, one hears of amenity improvements being considered or maintenance needs recognized as requiring attention. For those who are curious about Hershey's Mill money matters, we will attempt to clarify how the money flows. As with each village, the ultimate source of needed funds is a levy on each household, so keeping informed is prudent.

Caution: The writer is not an official of the Mill. The following is his understanding of how things work.

The Mill operates as a non-profit organization with resident funding. (Hershey's Mill Community TV is a separate, self-supporting nonprofit organization). Operating funds for the Mill come from a monthly assessment from each house, and a Capital Improvement Fee assessed on newcomers moving here.

The monthly assessment levied by the Master Association (MA) on all units is not obvious as it is included in the condo fee for your village. This provides for the running and maintenance of roads, landscaping, and common amenities such as the Community Center, sports complex, pool, etc.

Included in the monthly assessment is a charge of \$7.50 per month per house which is designated as the Vision Quest Fund. This was instituted in 2010 to fund improvements to the Community Center, and was subsequently voted to remain in effect after that work was completed in 2012. This fund is used to fund new projects or upgrades to existing amenities.

A Capital Improvement Fund (CIF) was enacted in 2014 and is collected each time a house is sold in the Mill. The Uniform Planned Community Act - PA allows the collection of this fund to finance capital improvements. For conservative budgeting purposes, the MA typically assumes an average of 80 home sales each year. It is important to realize this money can only be used for capital improvements, not maintenance.

A current major need is for remediation of storm water management problems which have affected homes in several villages. There is also interest in expansion of the community sports area and an enlargement of the Community Center. That will be a major expenditure which will require the approval of the whole Master Association. In view of storm water management needs throughout the Mill, the MA has deferred further action relative to the Community Center for a few months.

The Village President is the resident's representation on the Master Association. Inputs relative to individual's feelings on expenditures can be conveyed to him/her.
